

GLOSSARY

The order of words is alphabetical: **æ** and **ǣ** are placed between **ad** and **af**; **þ** and **ð** are between **tg** and **ti** except when initial; words beginning with **þ** or **ð** follow those beginning with **t**.

Strong verbs are distinguished by an arabic numeral denoting the class to which they belong. Weak verbs are followed by W.I, W.II, or W.III to denote the class. Preteritive present verbs are marked **PP**, anomalous verbs **A**. Nouns are followed by **m.** (masculine), **f.** (feminine), or **n.** (neuter). Words belonging to other parts of speech are followed by the conventional abbreviations.

The principal parts of strong and irregular weak verbs are given for those that occur in the earlier reading material. For the later material the principal parts are mostly omitted if the verb is perfectly regular. The paragraph numbers of the *Reference Grammar* are added to entries when essential information is there given.

In the definitions, commas separate synonyms. Semicolons separate different meanings. The senses are arranged in the most probable order of development.

Variant spellings and many puzzling forms are covered by cross references. Sometimes both spellings are entered and treated in full. In the later selections the student will sometimes be obliged to familiarize himself with scribal practice:
